

1. Why does your jurisdiction need and Alternative Diversion Requirement? Describe why SRRE selected programs did not achieve 50% diversion. Identify barriers to meeting the 50% goal and briefly indicate how they will be overcome.

Programs listed in the extension request are existing and/or new programs. The new programs need time for scheduling and implementation. Outreach and education needed to obtain the projected diversion rates take time and must be continuous and repetitive to have the necessary impact. It was expected that the programs implemented would achieve the required diversion rates; however, given the unusual nature of the Imperial Valley, the programs alone have not been sufficient for several reasons.

Imperial Valley covers 4,597 square miles with a population density of 31 people per square mile. However, Mexicali, the capital city of Baja California is situated directly across the border and has an estimated population of 850,000. Over 9 million vehicles cross the border into Imperial Valley annually carrying millions of legally and illegally employed workers who substantially contribute to the solid waste disposal but not necessarily to recycling efforts. Imperial Valley is also visited by 1,500,000 bird watchers, off road enthusiasts and winter "snow birds" each year resulting in increased volumes of solid waste. This influx of people substantially skews the formula for determining disposal statistics.

Approximately 75% of the population in Imperial Valley is Hispanic with English as a second language. Educational efforts are proceeding, first at the schools, and slowly at other community events. All brochures, fact sheets, and advertisements have been translated into Spanish. Displays have been set up at public facilities, i.e. City Hall, library, utilities payment areas. The Task Force and City of Brawley Public Works staff have scheduled more public information and community outreach events.

In 1999 the City of Brawley, along with the County and the other six incorporated cities in the County, formed the Imperial Valley Waste Management Task Force to implement and evaluate all elements of the jurisdictions' SRREs. The Task Force unsuccessfully used outside consultants until 2000 to manage SRRE programs. In 2000, with declining diversion percentages, the Task Force began to develop an in-house staff with the City of El Centro as lead agency. Initial turnover and inexperience stymied early efforts, but current staff are making progress.

There are also cultural differences regarding what constitutes "trash," the concept of recycling, and paying for these services. The City of Brawley is the only jurisdiction in the Task Force which provides its own trash hauling. The equipment and layout of the community has created some difficulties in establishing curbside programs. The City of Brawley, however, has dedicated one of its sanitation workers to solicit business accounts for recycling (primarily cardboard) pickup. The City of Brawley has also redesigned the Public Works Yard parking lot and access area to provide for a drive through drop off area for recycling. A new HHW facility is also under construction in Brawley. The City of Brawley has also been successful in encouraging contractors to recycle construction and demolition materials.

In 2002 Allied Waste brought in new management that has provided more solid support for recycling efforts. The relationship between the hauler and the Task Force is improving and as a result, more services are being offered, i.e. commercial recycling and Christmas Tree recycling. Allied Waste is discussing helping the City of Brawley by negotiating a contract for use of the MRF and accepting greenwaste at the landfill for ADR.

The City of Brawley's diversion rate history has been inconsistent despite the fact that several programs were implemented since 1995. The diversion rate was 39% in 1995, 40% in 1996, 3% in 1997, no rate in 1998, 31% in 1999, and 30% in 2000. This was the major indicator in establishing a new base year, which was completed during 2002 for the year 2000. The diversion rate originally submitted on the new base year was in excess of 60%. However, because the packing sheds were unable to provide authenticated weight tickets, only 31% was verified. Brawley submitted a revised base year which was board approved at 40%.

However, the new and existing programs will not contribute high enough diversion rates to meet the 50% diversion requirement. The new programs that the Task Force and the City of Brawley are implementing will require time for creation of the infrastructure and implementation schedule, i.e. construction and demolition and composting services.

2. Why is your jurisdiction requesting an Alternative Diversion Requirement in lieu of a Time Extension?

The City of Brawley needs two years to meet the diversion requirements because:

The development of a C & D ordinance requires buy-in from stakeholders as well as legal review. We believe that this is the area that will provide the most benefit towards meeting the diversion requirements.

The re-allocation of staff time to resource reduction, reuse, and recycling activities will require time for contacts, development of materials, purchase of additional supplies, and training.

3. Describe your jurisdiction's Good Faith Efforts to implement the programs in its SRRE.

In 1992 the City of Brawley adopted a comprehensive plan to meet the diversion requirements over 10 years. In 1995 the City of Brawley's diversion rate was 39%, which was board approved, indicating that the City of Brawley was successfully implementing its long term goals. During the past three years a number of events have occurred which have positively impacted the implementation of our long-term strategies. Our successes are a result of the following:

Formation of the Imperial Valley Waste Management Task Force, a joint powers agreement.

Participation in funding the 1992 SRRE plan by all eight Cities and Imperial County.

Construction of the Household Hazardous Waste Facility, which began operation on January 5, 2002.

Establishing a new HHW facility in Brawley which will open by March 2003.

Employment of fulltime staffing budgeted through 2006.

Employment of an educational consultant to present a comprehensive education program for grades 4 through 6.

Reallocation of the time of a solid-waste employee to include three hours per day of source reduction, reuse, and recycling activities.

Hiring Charles Tenborg of EcoSolutions to manage and operate the HHW facilities.

Commercial cardboard pick up has been implemented.

Established city operated public drop off center to accept cardboard and beverage containers.

Annual spring clean up conducted in which residents are able to set out white goods which are recycled at scrap metal vendor.

Grasscycling at public areas.

Public works staff have attended an ARAM (Asphalt Rubber Aggregate Membrane) workshop to consider using recycled rubber/asphalt in repair and maintenance projects.

Staff considering contracting with local company to recycle the asphalt and concrete for city.

4. Describe any relevant circumstances in the jurisdiction that contribute to the need for an ADR. Provide any relevant information that supports the request.

The City of Brawley and the other members of the Imperial Valley Waste Management Task Force are moving toward becoming a regional agency during 2002. Becoming a part of a regional agency will reinforce efforts to meet the diversion requirements.

Several changes in demographics including an increase in population have increased the amount of waste generation.

Since 1991, Brawley has increased its sales tax rate causing a decline of new businesses.
