1. Why does your jurisdiction need an Alternative Diversion Requirement? Describe why SRRE selected programs did not achieve 50% diversion. Identify barriers to meeting the 50% goal and briefly indicate how they will be overcome.

Programs listed in the extension request are existing and/or new programs. The new programs need time for scheduling and implementation. Outreach and education needed to obtain the projected diversion rates take time and must be continuous and repetitive to have the necessary impact.

It was expected that the programs implemented would achieve the required diversion rates; however, given the unusual nature of the Imperial Valley, the programs alone have not been sufficient for several reasons. Imperial Valley covers 4,597 square miles with a population density of 31 people per square mile. However, Mexicali, the capital city of Baja California is situated directly across the border and has an estimated population of 850,000. Over 9 million vehicles cross the border into Imperial Valley annually carrying millions of legally and illegally employed workers who substantially contribute to the solid waste disposal but not necessarily to recycling efforts. Imperial Valley is visited by 1,500,000 bird watchers, off road enthusiasts and winter "snow birds" each year resulting in increased volumes of solid waste. This influx of people substantially skews the formula for determining disposal statistics.

Approximately 75% of the population in Imperial Valley is Hispanic with English as a second language. In the City of Calexico this percentage is even greater creating language problems. There are also cultural differences regarding what constitutes "trash," the concept of recycling, and paying for these services.

Political issues in Calexico have created an interesting barrier to diversion goal achievement, particularly in the area of curbside recycling; a highly vocal group of citizens demanded twice a week garbage pick up requiring the hauler to alternate weekly pickups for green waste and recyclables. Trash pick up is on Monday and Thursday. Recycling and green waste pick up is on Wednesday in alternating weeks. The prevailing philosophy is that when the first trash container is full, move on to fill the next one. Currently the contamination rate approaches 50%. Educational efforts are proceeding, first at the schools, and slowly at other community events.

In 1999, the City of Calexico, along with the County and the other six incorporated cities in the County, formed the Imperial Valley Waste Management Task Force to implement and evaluate all elements of the jurisdictions' SRRE's. The Task Force unsuccessfully used outside consultants until 2000 to manage SRRE programs. In 2000, with declining diversion percentages, the Task Force began to develop an in-house staff with the City of El Centro as lead agency. Initial turnover and inexperience stymied early efforts, but current staff are making progress.

In 1999 Allied Waste took over the trash collection and disposal contracts for 7 of the 8 member jurisdictions, including Calexico. Allied's philosophy was for less community involvement. The Task Force filled this void by upgrading the Recycling Coordinator's position and by developing subcommittees to work on specific projects.

In 2000, six jurisdictions, including Calexico, implemented an automated three-can residential curbside collection system, thinking this would significantly increase diversion percentages. The curbside program is still being evaluated.

In 2002 Allied Waste brought in new management that has provided more solid support for recycling efforts. The relationship between the hauler and the Task Force is improving and as a result, more services are being offered, i.e. commercial recycling and Christmas Tree recycling.

The City of Calexico's diversion rate history has been inconsistent despite the fact that several programs were implemented since 1995. The diversion rate was 37% in 1995, 35% in 1996, no rate in 1997 and 1998, 5% in 1999, and -5% in 2000. This was the major indicator in establishing a new base year, which was completed during 2002 for the year 2000. The diversion rate originally submitted on the new base year was in excess of 50%. However, after the verification visits, the CIWMB staff were able to authenticate only 31%.

To overcome these barriers, the City of Calexico has agreed to provide an extra recycling container to residents at no additional cost. Task Force hauler representatives have attended City Council meetings to discuss the possibility of reducing the number of garbage collection days.

All brochures and advertisements have been translated into Spanish. Displays are being set up at public facilities, i.e. City Hall and library. Task Force staff have scheduled more public information and community outreach events in Calexico and solicited Spanish speaking staff to attend.

These existing programs will not contribute high enough diversion rates to meet the 50% diversion requirement. The new programs that the Task Force and the City of Calexico are implementing will require time for creation of the infrastructure and implementation schedule, i.e. construction and demolition and composting services.

2. Why is your jurisdiction requesting an Alternative Diversion Requirement in lieu of a Time Extension?

The City of Calexico is requesting an Alternative Diversion Requirement in lieu of a Time Extension because it is apparent after compiling the percentages that the 50% diversion rate will not be met within two years. However, the Imperial Valley Waste Management Task Force, of which Calexico is a member, is in the process of applying for a regional agency status. The higher diversion rates of the County and the City of El Centro will help the smaller jurisdictions, including Calexico, meet the diversion requirement.

The two year extension will also give Calexico time to implement the ordinances and continue to gather support for recycling behaviors from residences and businesses.

3. Describe your jurisdiction's Good Faith Efforts to implement the programs in its SRRE.

In 1992 the City of Calexico adopted a comprehensive plan to meet the diversion requirements over 10 years. Participating in the formation of the Imperial Valley Waste Management Task Force, a joint powers agreement for implementation and analysis of SRRE programs, was instrumental in goal achievement. In 1995 the City of Calexico's diversion rate of 37%, which was board approved, indicated that the City of Calexico was successfully implementing its long term goals.

During the past three years a number of events have occurred which have positively impacted the implementation of Calexico's long-term strategies.

*Construction of the Household Hazardous Waste Facility, which began operation on January 5, 2002.

*Construction of MRF

*Implementation of curbside recycling program

*Employment of fulltime staffing budgeted through 2006.

*Employment of an educational consultant to present a comprehensive education program for grades 4 through 6.

*Hiring Charles Tenborg of EcoSolutions to build and manage and operate the HHW facility.

*Commercial cardboard pick up has been implemented, including two area 7-11 stores.

*Completion of a new base year (year 2000) which provided more precise information about what recycling was actually being accomplished and specific areas to target for programs.

*Public Works Department recycling concrete.

*The Calexico School District is becoming involved in developing its own recycling program and other environmentally sound practices, i.e. CNG buses and fleet vehicles.

4. Describe any relevant circumstances in the jurisdiction that contribute to the need for an ADR. Provide any relevant information that supports the request.

1. The city managers and director of the County Board of Supervisors of all Imperial Valley jurisdictions have endorsed the formation of a regional agency for SRRE programs. Steps are proceeding to place this item on each Council's agenda.

2. Public Works Dept. uses the cold grind process and is reviewing its data to determine precise weights and verifiable amounts to potentially amend the Base Year.

3. Steps are being made to modify the current curbside collection program to eliminate one trash pick up day which will require substantive lobbying.

4. Salvagers from Mexicali currently take construction and demolition material from area job sites to be used in Mexican construction. This is a large amount of tonnage which has not been documentable.

5. Several area recycling/salvaging businesses are reluctant to share information with an official state agency. The Task Force staff and City of Calexico officials are working to improve relationships.
